# The Prophecy of the Good Shepherd Ezekiel 34: 1-16

The word of the Lord came to me: Mortal, prophesy against the shepherds of Israel: prophesy, and say to them—to the shepherds: Thus says the Lord God: Ah, you shepherds of Israel who have been feeding yourselves! Should not shepherds feed the sheep? You eat the fat, you clothe yourselves with the wool, you slaughter the fatlings; but you do not feed the sheep. You have not strengthened the weak, you have not healed the sick, you have not bound up the injured, you have not brought back the strayed, you have not sought the lost, but with force and harshness you have ruled them. So they were scattered, because there was no shepherd; and scattered, they became food for all the wild animals. My sheep were scattered, they wandered over all the mountains and on every high hill; my sheep were scattered over all the face of the earth, with no one to search or seek for them.

Therefore, you shepherds, hear the word of the Lord: As I live, says the Lord God, because my sheep have become a prey, and my sheep have become food for all the wild animals, since there was no shepherd; and because my shepherds have not searched for my sheep, but the shepherds

have fed themselves, and have not fed my sheep; therefore, you shepherds, hear the word of the Lord: Thus says the Lord God, I am against the shepherds; and I will demand my sheep at their hand, and put a stop to their feeding the sheep; no longer shall the shepherds feed themselves. I will rescue my sheep from their mouths, so that they may not be food for them.

For thus says the Lord God: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice.

# The New of Life in Christ Romans 6: 1-13

What then are we to say? Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness.

# The Holy Gospel, according to John, 10: 1-18

"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers."

Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because

I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

The Gospel of the Lord.

Reflecting on the Scriptures: "But We Are Not Sheep"

In late March and early April, the sign in front of the First Baptist Church of American in Providence, RI, said this: Had not planned on giving up quite this much for Lent."

Indeed. None of us, I think it's safe to say, had planned on giving up this much.

It's not Lent anymore, but it doesn't really feel like Easter to me. I'm still wandering around in the wilderness, long past the usual 40 days, trying to figure out what's safe and what's not, adjusting to being home almost all the time, worried about others and feeling pretty helpless when it comes to helping them.

And I know I'm one of the lucky ones! So many others have much more significant things on their minds –

- their jobs,
- their health,
- the health of loved ones,
- grieving the loss of loved ones.

Into this time and place of anxiety and fear, insecurity and death, comes this lectionary passage about Jesus the Good Shepherd. Usually this is an easy theme for preachers. This year it begs to be contradicted, or at least questioned. Really, Jesus? *Are* you a Good Shepherd? What were you doing when this virus snuck through the gate?

The image is meant to be comforting: Jesus as the Good Shepherd who gathers his sheep and uses his very self as the gate to the sheepfold, preventing thieves and robbers from entering and doing harm. We want to be reassured, to think of ourselves as one of Jesus' flock, known by name and protected by Jesus. But it's challenging to feel that way right now, surrounded as we are by danger and fear.

What happens to the sheep when the wolves get in?

Most of us do not know much about sheep. Maybe some of you do. My guess is that most of you are more like me. My experience with sheep is quite limited. I have encountered them at county fairs and on trips to Greenfield Village where I watched sheep-shearing and learned to watch where I stepped.

I have come to understand that sheep are not very intelligent. It has been said that God created sheep in order to make chickens look smart.

In contrast, Jesus' listeners knew a lot about sheep. When Jesus spoke about shepherds and sheep, he was speaking to people who had everyday experiences with sheep and lambs, goats and kids. They drank the milk of those animals, turned that milk into cheese, used their wool...and ate them for dinner.

Jesus' listeners knew a lot about sheep and they were used to hearing God described as their Good Shepherd.

- They knew the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm just as we do, "The Lord is my Shepherd."
- They knew the 79<sup>th</sup> Psalm, we are "your people and the sheep of your pasture."
- They knew that in the book of the prophet Ezekiel, God declares "I myself will search for my sheep and will seek them out...I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep....." (Ezek 34:11).

The earliest Christians were familiar with the same image. As we heard in today's reading, John's Gospel uses it as one of many images that expresses who Jesus is: the vine, the bread of life, the living water, the light of the world.

Here he is the good shepherd, who leads his sheep out to find abundant pasture, and he is the gate that protects his flock from thieves and robbers.

On the wall of the the earliest known house church, located in what is now Syria, there is a fresco (a mural) of the shepherd Jesus carrying a lamb upon his shoulders. It is painted above the spot where the baptismal font stood, the symbol of entry into Christian life.

Even now, when so few of us know anything about sheep or shepherds, the image is compelling: Jesus guides and protects and provides throughout all of life, at the beginning and at the end.

Compelling, and perhaps for some of us, at this point, challenging. How is Jesus guiding us now? How is Jesus protecting us now?

Rev. Laura Mendenhall grew up in farming territory and, unlike most of the rest of us, does know something about sheep. In contrast to our mental picture of the shepherd leading the flock from in front – like the drum major in front of a marching band, she says that much of a shepherd's leading actually comes from the back.

In order to keep the sheep from overgrazing their pastures, she says, shepherds have to move their flocks frequently. But they can't do this by charging out in front and shouting orders to them. "Here sheep, sheep, come this way. Follow me, sheep, turn here." If they were to try to guide their sheep this way, the animals would probably just turn around and go in the opposite direction.

Instead shepherds work from behind – talking, singing, coaxing, and encouraging, giving orders to the dogs who nip at the sheep's heels to keep them going. The shepherds keep an eye on the stragglers and the wanderers, the injured and the sick; they pay special attention to the ones who are most vulnerable to being left behind and set upon by predators.

The sheep may not recognize the shepherd's face, because they rarely see it. But they do recognize the shepherd's voice, encouraging them from behind, and they trust it.

You and I may not know much about sheep, but the comparison is easy to recognize. Like the sheep, and especially right now, we are aware that we live in a world that is filled with abundance...and danger.

- Doing our shopping in a face mask;
- washing our hands and wondering if we should wash the groceries, too;
- deciding whether venturing out of the house is worth it or not.

We feel as vulnerable as sheep.

No wonder we wish Jesus would be out in front, fending off all danger, directing us to the safe route, keeping us from making mistakes and creating our own dangers.

No wonder we wish he'd show us exactly where to go and what to do. Then we would have someone else to blame when things go wrong!

But Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and he usually leads from behind.

- He does not shout orders, but offers wisdom and guidance.
- He pays special attention to the most vulnerable the sick, the injured, the very young and the very old, the ones left behind.
- When we get ourselves into trouble, he picks us up.
- Most of the time he asks us to trust what we know.

Because in reality we are *not* sheep. Real sheep cannot be fairly expected to think for themselves. (Remember why God created chickens?) A shepherd's reason for gathering sheep together and protecting them is to fatten them up for the slaughter. Sheep are kept safe in the sheepfold, they are led to green pastures and protected from wolves, because they are going to be sold and eaten.

But we are not sheep! There are limits to all analogies and metaphors and we have found this one. We are gathered and guarded not for slaughter and not to be eaten, but for love and redemption and service.

The abundant life that our Good Shepherd leads us to is one of amazing grace and endless love. We can trust our shepherd to pay attention when we are vulnerable, to care for us when we are sick or injured, to seek us out when we wander into dangerous territory.

We are led to a life in which we can trust the shepherd's voice even when we do not see his face. But it is not a life free of risks or commitments.

Jesus knew this all too well. Because he is not only the shepherd and the gate, but also the lamb. Please listen carefully now. Jesus is the lamb, but he is not sacrificed to pay some sort of debt, or to satisfy God's wrath that cannot be appeased in any other way. Those are all theories of "atonement" developed much later in the history of the church. Particularly in John's Gospel, Jesus is not the Lamb because he pays a penalty but because in his death he reveals who God is, and how unconquerable God's love is.

Following the Good Shepherd all the way to the cross means that in the face of danger, we know security; that in the grip of sorrow or fear, we are sustained by love.

It means that when we walk on paths we would not choose for ourselves, we listen for the voice of the Shepherd and respond to his guidance, for we recognize that he knows where we're headed better than we do.

Being one of Jesus' flock does not mean that death will not come, that tragedy will not strike, that our hearts will not be broken. It means that whatever befalls us, we still know the presence and strength of God:

The Lord is my Shepherd,

Even though I walk through the corridors of the ICU, I will not fear death...

Though I pass through the valleys of depression or delusion, I am not alone...

Though I may test positive or love someone who does, I will fear no evil....

Though people may shun me, I will not lose heart...

For you anoint me...guard me...love me....

Jesus is the shepherd: he leads us to lives of abundant grace.

Jesus is the gate: he places himself between us and all that would destroy our faith and take away our true humanity.

Jesus is the lamb: he chose to follow the path that led to death but resulted in life. He submitted himself in order to reveal God's self.

Others may try to lead us, others may claim to be our shepherd, but we know the voice of Jesus. We know the way that he leads. Not armed with swords or hate of fear, but with courage and faith, leading us to pastures of peace.

In mid-March, just as the real danger of Covid-19 was making itself known to most of us in the United States, and as the shortages of protective equipment for medical workers was becoming evident, Joseph Alonso, chief stonemason for the National Cathedral in Washington DC remembered something important.

He remembered that 14 years ago, during an outbreak of the H5N1 flu, the Cathedral had purchased more than 5000 N95 respiratory masks – the kind that medical workers need to protect themselves and that were in tragic short supply.

The Cathedral had made the purchase as a precaution for during pastoral care visits, for the safety of the cleaning staff, and for other staff members who had to deal with the public. But they turned out not to be necessary in 2006 and they were stashed away in an unfinished area of the crypt level of the cathedral. In other words, this protective, life-saving equipment lay just feet away from the tombs of many famous Americans.

The masks were technically expired, but the hospitals in Washington DC were desperate. And on March 25, 3000 of them were delivered to Georgetown University Hospital and 2,000 to Children's National Hospital.

It might not feel like any other Easter we've known before, but it is Easter! The rock is rolled away, the tomb is empty, and God's life-giving, life-saving Spirit is out among us. We – who can act just like sheep sometimes – are called by God to think and act like the human disciples we truly are. Sharing our resources, sharing love and life, trusting the Good Shepherd who moves us forward into the new pastures and places that are waiting for us.

Let's close in prayer, using one that we often hear at funerals. But we pray it today not because we are at the end, but because we know our Good Shepherd and we follow his voice from beginning all the way to the end:

Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend ourselves, your servants.

Acknowledge, we humbly pray:

The sheep of your own fold,

The lambs of your own flock,

The sinners of your own redeeming.

Receive us into the arms of your mercy,

into the blessed rest of everlasting peace,

And into the glorious company of the saints of light. Amen.
